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Process of Decision Making and Key Decision-Making Points at LHMC & Associated Hospitals

Lady Hardinge Medical College (LHMC) and its associated hospitals — Smt. Sucheta Kriplani Hospital (SSKH) and Kalawati Saran Children's Hospital (KSCH) — function under the administrative control of the Ministry of Health & Family Welfare (MoHFW), Government of India.

All decisions are made in accordance with **rules**, **policies**, **and guidelines** issued by the Government of India, and follow a defined hierarchical structure and workflow process.

1. Levels of Decision Making

A. Institutional Level Decision-Making (Within LHMC & Associated Hospitals)

Decisions are taken at various levels based on the nature and category of the subject:

Level	Decision-Making Authority	Type of Decisions
Level I	Section/Unit Head (Clerical/Technical)	Routine matters, record keeping, internal processing
Level II	AMS /HoDs / Nursing Superintendent / Store Officer	Departmental, clinical, procurement, staff deployment
Level III	Medical Superintendent / Principal/Additional Medical Superintendent/Deputy Director (Admin)	Hospital administration, HR, logistics, purchases
Level IV	Director LHMC	Final approval of administrative, academic, and financial matters under delegated powers
Level V	Ministry of Health & Family Welfare (MoHFW)	Major policy matters, creation of posts, high-value procurement, legal matters, infrastructure projects

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2. Broad Steps in Decision Making Process

1. Initiation of Proposal

- The concerned section/unit prepares a proposal or note based on need or direction.
- Initiated by LDC/UDC and examined by Section Officer or Assistant Administrative Officer.

2. Examination and Processing

- Proposal is scrutinized for rule compliance, past precedents, and financial implications.
- Draft note is prepared and forwarded to higher authorities for comments and recommendations.

3. Departmental/Committee Review (if required)

- Purchase Committee, Academic Council, Hospital Management Committee, or other institutional committees may be consulted.
- Committees give recommendations or minutes based on majority consensus or expert opinion.

4. Approval/Sanction

- Final decision is taken by the competent authority as per **Delegation of Financial Powers** or **Administrative hierarchy**.
- In certain cases, proposals are forwarded to **MoHFW** for final decision or concurrence.

5. Implementation and Communication

- Once approved, necessary actions are taken such as issuing orders, procuring items, or implementing administrative directions.
- Communication is made to concerned departments or individuals.

3. Key Decision-Making Points

- **Director, LHMC** Final authority for decisions within the institution under delegated powers.
- Medical Superintendent & Additional Medical Superintendent (SSKH/KSCH) Operational head of the hospitals; decides on patient care delivery, maintenance, and hospital operations.
- Head of Departments (HoDs) Take academic, clinical, and department-level operational decisions.
- **Purchase Committee** Decision on procurement of equipment, drugs, and consumables.
- Hospital Management Committee Oversight of service delivery, planning, and grievance redressal.
- Principal/Academic Council Approves academic courses, teaching schedules, and examination planning.
- **MoHFW** Takes decisions beyond institutional autonomy, including recruitment rules, post creation, policy matters, and high-value approvals.



4. Use of e-Office and File Tracking Systems

- Decisions are increasingly taken and tracked via e-Office platform, ensuring transparency, traceability, and accountability.
- Every file or note has a **unique registration and movement path** that can be monitored by authorized users.

Conclusion

The decision-making process at LHMC & Associated Hospitals follows a **multi-tiered structure** in compliance with Government of India rules and is designed to ensure **transparency, accountability, and timely execution**. All major decisions are either taken at the institutional level under delegated authority or referred to the **Ministry of Health & Family Welfare** as per laid down norms.

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
